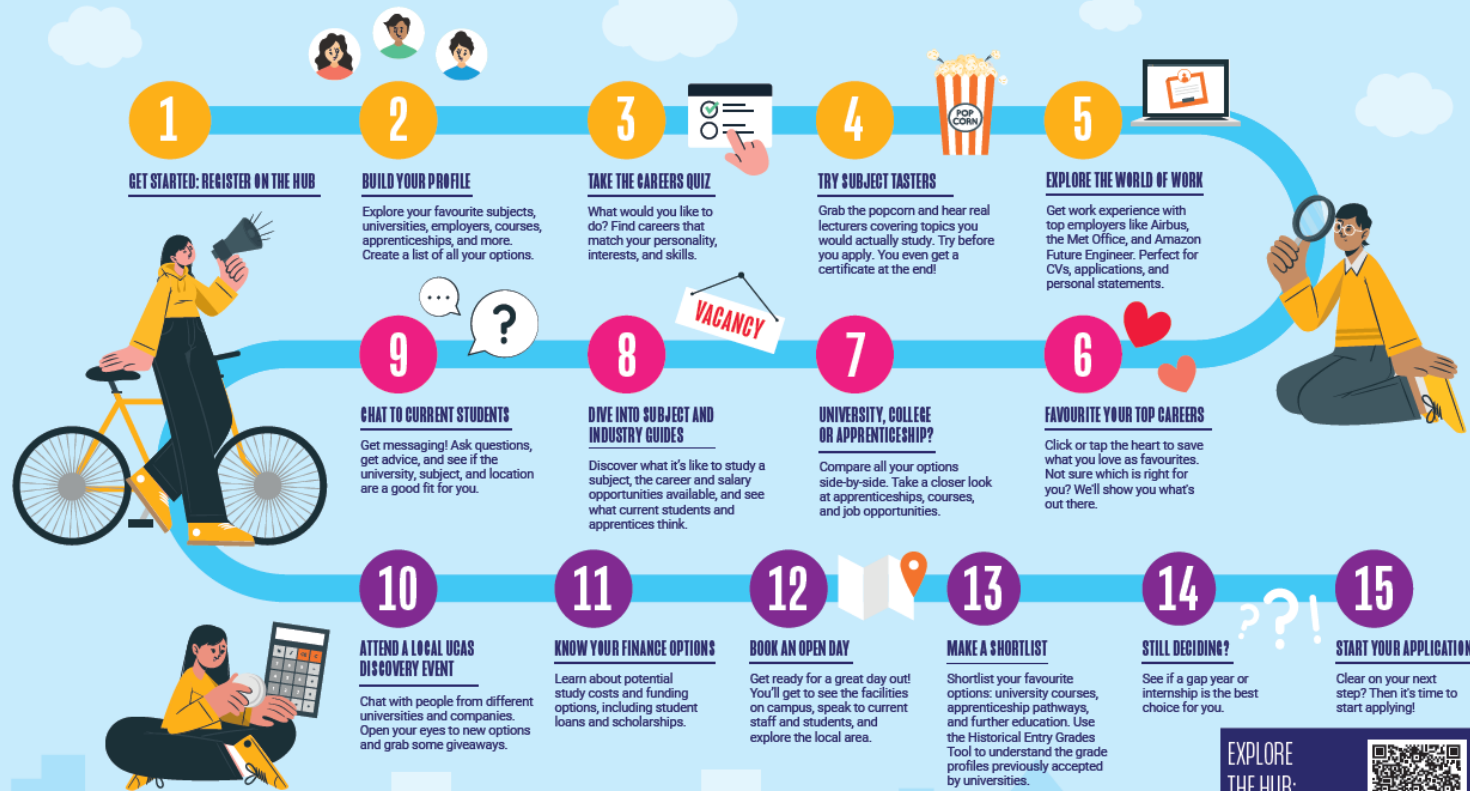

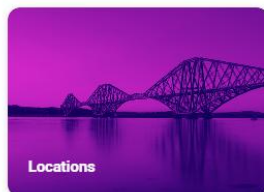

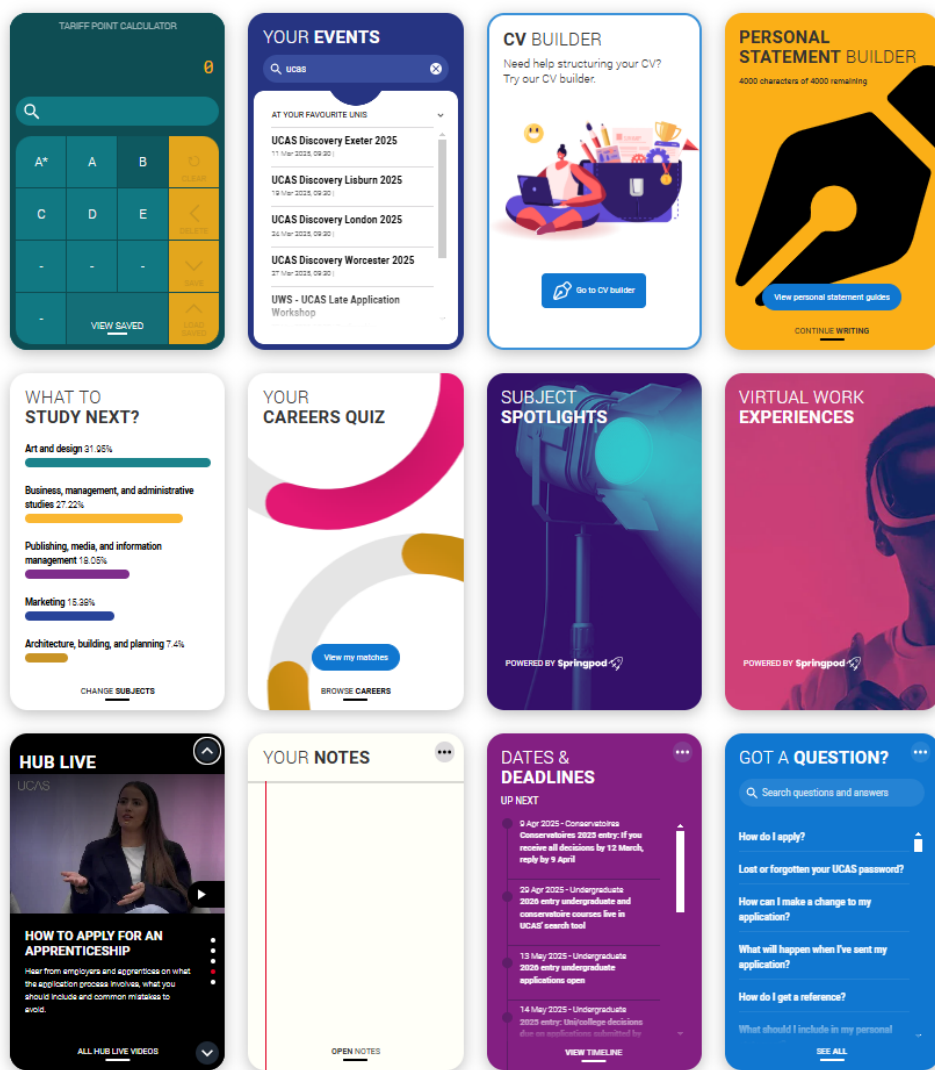

When can I apply?

- Advertised throughout the year; with no single application deadline.
- Larger organisations with multiple application processes may recruit earlier than smaller local organisations.
- Higher apprenticeships with a Sep/Oct start tend to recruit in the previous academic year.

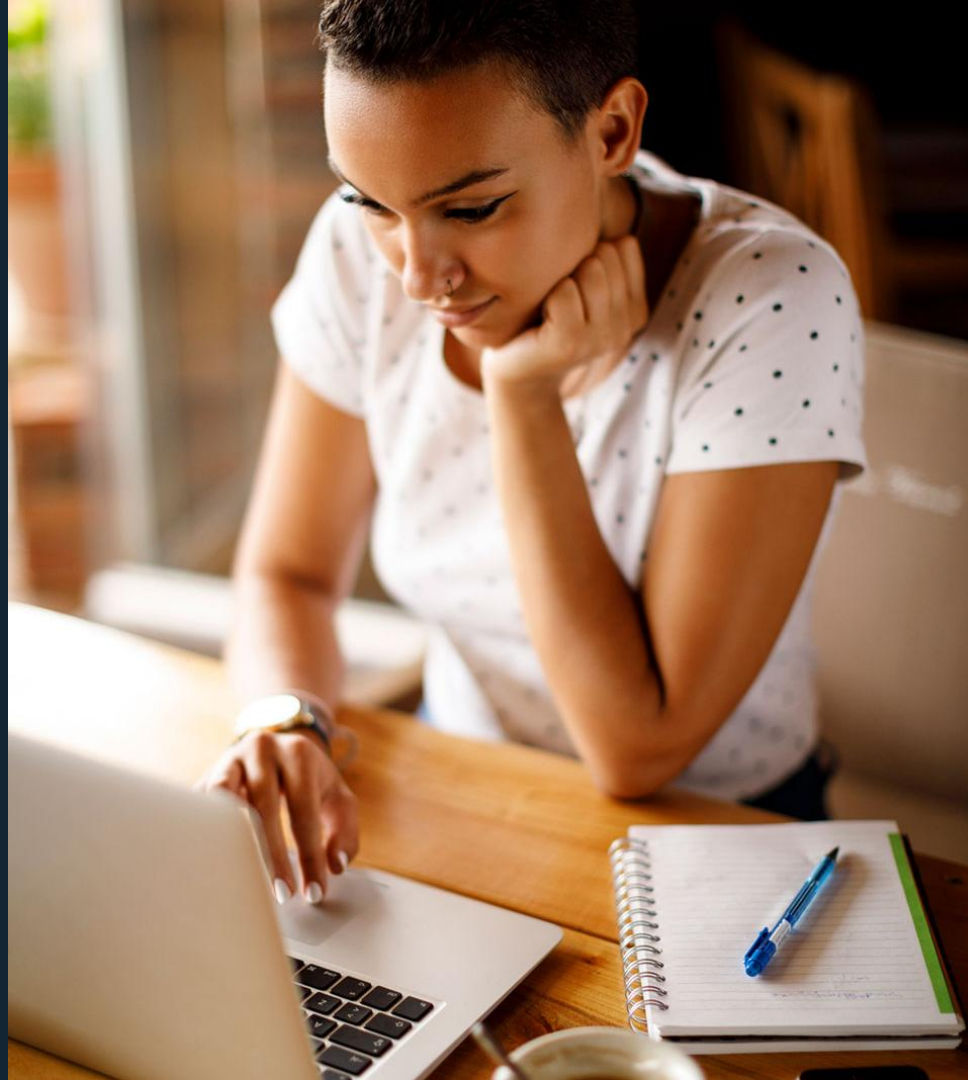

How do I apply?

- Applications are made directly through the company or training provider.
- There is no limit on the number of applications you can make.
- The application process might vary across vacancies, you could be asked for:
 - CV and Covering Letter
 - Application Form
 - In App/Site application

I recently spent some time with the Environment Agency, working in their local Analysis and Reporting team. I helped process and identify some freshwater invertebrate samples, where I used a dissecting microscope and taxonomic keys. I learned about freshwater invertebrates sampling methods and how the data is used to classify rivers. This experience taught me some useful laboratory skills and showed me how biology can be applied. I plan to expand my skills and gain further experience in helping with field work.

A note on deferring

If you know that you want to have a gap year...

You can still apply this year, but you choose the start date of the course as September 28.

This allows you to see what offers you can get, which could mean you have a gap year with the knowledge that your place is all sorted. You can book accommodation etc. nice and early.

If you change your mind, you can decline your offer any time before the start of the course and can make a new application to ucas.

If you are unsure

Apply for a course starting September 27 and if you change your mind and want to defer, you can ring the university and ask them. They mostly say yes, but occasionally may ask you to reapply.

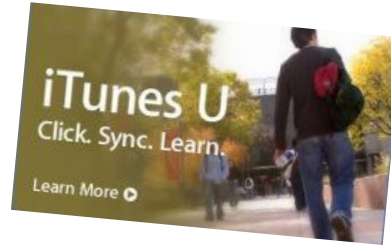

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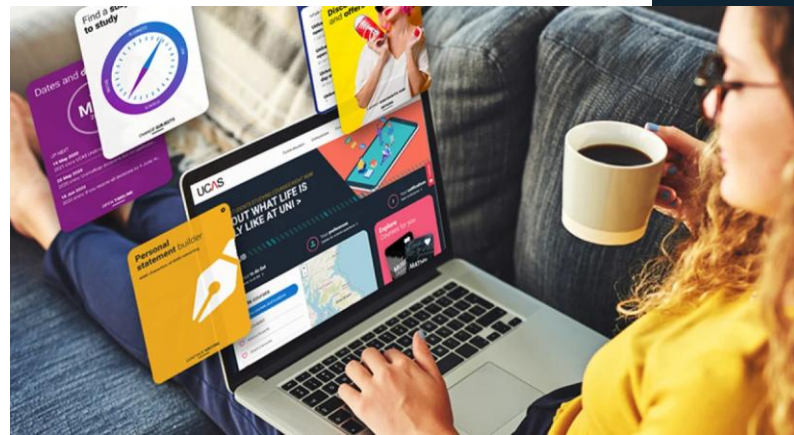
